Rules and Regulations

Exhibitors are requested to carefully read all Rules and Regulations governing the Horticultural & Creative Crafts Show

- 1 Please list entries in the order shown in the Booklet. Every exhibitor MUST fill out a separate entry form. Extra entry forms and tags are available at the Two Hills & District Agricultural Society office or may be downloaded from the website at www.twohillsagsociety.com. Exhibitor numbers can be picked up at the Ag office or by calling (780) 657-3542.
- 2 For each exhibit, a tag will be furnished to exhibitors. Exhibitors MUST CLEARLY AND CORRECTLY specify entry number, article description, exhibitor number, printed name and mailing address. The tag must remain attached to the exhibit during the show. NOTE: Teens/Juniors/and PeeWees: please include your age on your entry form.
- 3 No exhibitor may show more than one entry per class. All exhibits must be the work of the individual exhibitor and have been made/grown within the last 12 months. Exhibits must be clean and fresh.
- 4 An exhibitor may show an entry in an upper class provided it is not listed in their original class. Example; a junior can show spinach under the adult class because it is not listed in the junior class. An exhibitor can only go up **one** level and must understand that their exhibit will be competing against others in the higher level.
- 5 ALLERGY ALERT!! Baking is to have NO NUTS OR PEANUT BUTTER as ingredients.
- 6 All canning and baking exhibits must be homemade. No commercial or store-purchased mixes are acceptable.
- 7 All articles presented must be displayed as outlined, otherwise they will be disqualified. There will be no switching of articles to accommodate an exhibitor's mistake. Any prize incorrectly named or listed is not to be awarded a prize.
- 8 If you wish to enter some of your exhibits at an earlier date (no sooner than the Thursday before the exhibit date, please contact any of the Committee members listed below to make other arrangements.
- 9 The Alberta Weed Control Act has proclaimed Common Baby's-Breath as a noxious weed. Common Baby's-Breath can **ONLY** be accepted in the floral arrangements.
- 10 Two copies of the <u>Judging and Exhibiting Standards for Horticultural Shows</u> are available at the Two Hills Ag Society office. These copies are available for loan with a \$20.00 refundable deposit. Books can be loaned for a period of one week. Books can also be purchased from **Publications Office**, **Alberta Agriculture** and Food; Phone 1-800-292-5697 or viewed on their website: www.agriculture.gov.ab/publications
- 11 Judges will withhold awarding prizes where the exhibit is deemed not worthy, even if there is no competion Judges may award 2nd or 3rd prizes when an exhibit does not come up to the proper standards.
- 12 No money shall be paid out as a prize unless the exhibit has been offered in the prize list.

- 13 Prizes will be awarded in order 1st, 2nd, 3rd. Prize money will be awarded as indicated in the prize book. There will be no ties (School Art is the exception)
- 14 No person who has an entry will be allowed in the building while judging is being done. Society Directors and volunteers are the exception.
- 15 The Show Committee of the Two Hills & District Agricultural Society reserves the right to decide on any point that is not covered by these Rules & Regulations.
- 16 While the Committee members take every precaution under the circumstances to secure the safety of articles submitted to the exhibition, the owners themselves must take the risk of exhibiting. Should any article be accidentally injured, lost, or stolen, the Committee members will give all assistance in their power toward the recovery, but will not make payment for the value thereof.
- 17 Any exhibitor lodging a protest must do so in writing and it must be delivered to a Show Committee member of the Two Hills & District Agricultural Society within 48 hours after the close of the Exhibition, accompanied by a deposit of \$20.00, which will be forfeited to the Society if the protest is not substantiated.
- 18 Prize money will be mailed to the winners within 30 days.
- 19 All winning entries will be posted on the Two Hills Ag Society website. If you have any objections to having your name posted on this site, please indicate such by written notice. If written notice is not received, your entry form will indicate that you are in agreement of having your name posted.

Vegetables

Prizes: 1st \$7.00; 2nd \$5.00; 3rd \$3.00

- 1. Carrots, beets, and turnips must have tops cut off half [1/2] inch above crown and should be uniform in size.
- 2. Vegetables must be clean but not scrubbed and free of any blemishes.
- 3. Display on white paper plates unless indicated by as asterisk(*)
- 4. Name variety whenever possible.

Judging Criteria:

Color: Should be bright, clean and attractive. A rich dark color is preferred.

Condition: Free from blemishes that are caused by insects, disease, dirt or mechanical damage.

Size: Should be of moderate size. Usually ovesized vegetables are course, tough and lacking in flavour.

Uniformity: All items in a display should be similar size, color, maturity and shape.

- 5. All foriculture must be grown by the exhibitor in current year.
- 6. Use clean containers with enough water to sustain the flowers during the show bench.

- 1. All Foods must be displayed on paper plates and covered with clear plastic or in a clear plastic bag.
- 2. Positively no ready mixes permitted. All baking and cooking must be work of exhibitor. Same dough for buns and bread is allowed.
- 3. All pie fillings must be homemade.
- 4. Display bread and loaves are to be whole loaf only.
- 5. Bread and buns should be evenly brown on top and bottom.
- 6. Breads should be smooth and springy when cut and should have a sweet odor.
- 7. All cookies should be same size, shape and color and should be moist and tender.
- 8. Biscuits should be golden brown and free from surface flour.
- 9. Dough should be rolled and cut.
- 10. Muffins should be moist and tender, free from tunnels.
- 11. Remove cupcake papers.
- 12. No Peanut Butter or Nuts in any baked items!

On June 16, 2010 the new Alberta Weed Control Act was proclaimed.

New Alberta Weed Control Act: Prohibited Noxious Weeds (46):

"prohibited noxious weeds - a person shall **destroy** a prohibited noxious weed that is on land the person owns or occupies"

Prohibited Noxious Weeds pose a serious threat and must be eradicated. These weeds spread rapidly and are highly competitive. Weeds in this category are restricted to prevent establishment in Alberta.
